SWAMPSCOTT — Swampscott will be showing off its talent next month.

Mourners gather to take a stance against violence

LYNN — A day after a double shooting in Central Square claimed one man's life and left another man recovering in the hospital, residents gathered for a community vigil.

"This is our city and we stand here tonight to stand with those who have been impacted by violence and we stand here tonight to gather to say we're against any violence as we move forward," said Sen. Thomas McGee (D-Lynn). "This is a great city. We love this

city and we're not going to stand by when these random acts of violence occur in our community. It does not reflect who we are. It doesn't reflect on what this city is about. It doesn't reflect on the great things that are happening in the city and it doesn't reflect on the great people that live in the city of Lynn."

Malden man takes gripe to Saugus Route 1

SAUGUS — It's a classic David versus Goliath battle.

The fight between Richard Stelmack of Malden and Sears has spilled out onto Route 1.

For months, the 63-year-old retired truck driver has been picketing in front of the Square One Mall.

His beef? Stelmack said the workers who delivered his 22-cubic-foot Kenmore refrigerator last summer caused \$3,200 damage to his kitchen floor.

"I noticed the gouges when the delivery guys drove away," he said. "I made a half dozen calls to Sears customer service and customer resolution, but they gave me the run around."

The lack of response from the retailer spurred Stelmack to march up and down the sidewalk in front of Sears with a sandwich board sign.

Since picketing began, two Sears employees have come out to talk to him. But Stelmack refused to discuss the case with them.

"What do they know about it?" he said. "These 20-something kids can't do anything for me."

Last fall, he heard from Border Transfer of Massachusetts, the Westwood company that made the delivery.

In the letter, Abe Matos, the

MEDFORD — It has been four years since two bombs detonated at the Boston Marathon changed the city of Boston and the region forever; the reverberations hit Medford especially hard with the death of Krystle Campbell.

The 29-year-old Medford High graduate and former University of Massachusetts-Boston student was one of three people killed during the initial attack April 15, 2013.

Medford has embraced her memory with an annual Medford High Mustang girls softball tour-

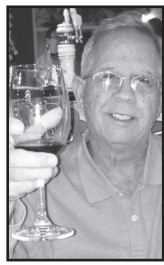

Prince Harry shares emotional struggles after Diana's death

LONDON — It is an image those who saw it will never forget: Prince William and Prince Harry — just boys, really — walking silently behind their mother's cortege as the world mourned Princess Diana's death in 1997.

Now Harry has revealed for the first time that losing his mother when he was only 12 left him in emotional turmoil for 20 years, filling him with grief and rage he could only manage after he sought counseling.

Breaking sharply with the royal tradition of maintaining a stoic silence about mental health, the 32-year-old prince told The Daily Telegraph in an interview published Monday that he had nearly suffered multiple breakdowns since his mother's death.

It was by far the most frank interview of Harry's life and gives the public a much fuller view of Harry and the inner turmoil he suffered growing up in the public eye after losing his mother.

He told the newspaper he "shut down all his emotions" for nearly 20 years and had been "very close to a complete breakdown on numerous occasions."

He describes a long, painful process of refusing to face his sense of loss that only came to an end

when he was in his late 20s and sought professional counseling to cope with the pressures and unhappiness.

"My way of dealing with it was sticking my head in the sand, refusing to ever think about my mum, because why would that help?" he said of his teens and 20s, a period in which he embarked on a successful military career but also occasionally attracted unwanted headlines, notably for being photographed playing "strip billiards" in Las Vegas.

In the interview, Harry said he had at times felt "on the verge of punching someone" and had taken up boxing as an outlet for the aggression he felt.

He said the long suppression of his grief eventually led to "two years of total chaos."

He said he was pretending that life was great until he started counseling and faced his problems head on.

"All of a sudden, all of this grief that I have never processed started to come to the forefront and I was like, there is actually a lot of stuff here that I need to deal with," he said.

Along with his brother Prince William and sister-in-law the Duchess of Cambridge, Harry has worked with a charity that promotes mental health. They have argued

that mental health problems must be given the same priority as other illnesses and should be spoken about openly and without stigma.

Harry has also worked extensively with wounded veterans and has organized the Invictus Games to foster international sporting competition for injured or ill service personnel and veterans.

Harry told interviewer Bryony Gordon, who has written extensively about her own struggles with depression and other issues, that he is in a "good place" now, and praised William for helping him seek help after many years of suffer-

ing in silence.

He credited counseling with helping him recover.

"I've now been able to take my work seriously, been able to take my private life seriously as well, and been able to put blood, sweat and tears into the things that really make a difference and things that I think will make a difference to everybody else," he said.

Harry has also formed a romantic relationship with American actress Meghan Markle and in November took the unusual step of chastising the press for harassing her.

Gas in Massachusetts up another 4 cents per gallon

BOSTON (AP) — The cost of a gallon of gasoline in Massachusetts is up another 4 cents in the past week, to its highest level since early January.

AAA Northeast reports Monday that self-serve, regular is selling for an average of \$2.28 per gallon.

The Massachusetts price is 12 cents lower than the national average, but 20 cents per gallon higher than the in-state average a year ago.

AAA found self-serve, regular selling for as low as \$2.15 per gallon and as high as \$2.44.

Ship may have hit endangered whale found dead

BOURNE (AP) — Researchers say preliminary findings show a North Atlantic right whale may have been struck by a ship before the animal was found dead in Massachusetts waters.

Officials with the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration say bruising consistent with blunt trauma could be evidence of a ship strike.

North Atlantic right whales are an endangered species. The World Wildlife Fund says only about 350 are still living.

The 27-foot long, 1-year-old female was found dead in Cape Cod Bay on Thursday and towed to a harbor where it could be placed on a flatbed for transport. A final analysis is expected to take weeks.

New England's 2016 unemployment bested national rate

BOSTON (AP) — The federal government

is reporting that New England's unemployment rate was lower than the national average last year.

The New England office of the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics said Monday that the six state region's average rate of 4.1 percent was lower than the national jobless rate of 4.9 percent in 2016. It was also lower than the 4.9 percent the region registered in 2015.

New Hampshire had one of the lowest unemployment rates in the nation at 2.8 percent last year.

Three other states also bested the national rate: Vermont at 3.3 percent, Massachusetts at 3.7 percent and Maine at 3.9 percent unemployment.

Two New England states, however, exceeded the national average: Connecticut at 5.1 percent and Rhode Island at 5.3 percent.

Top cop completes marathon for 1st time since 2013 bombings

BOSTON (AP) — Boston's top cop has completed his first marathon since the 2013 bombings.

Police Commissioner William Evans returned to the storied marathon for the first time as a runner Monday. He crossed the finish line with a time of about 3 hours and 50 minutes.

It was Evan's 19th time completing the race and his 52nd overall marathon.

Evans has been the city's police commissioner since 2014.

He had just completed the Boston Marathon in 2013 when two pressure cooker bombs detonated near the finish line, killing three people and injuring hundreds more.

Volunteer needed for Swampscott's town Conservation Commission

Don't forget your ballot for Swampscott local election

SWAMPSCOTT — Absentee ballots for the April 25 local election are available in the Town Clerk's office.

The absentee ballot deadline is noon April 24. Absentee ballots must be received in the clerk's office no later than 8 p.m. on Election Day.

All applications for absentee ballots must be made in writing. Applications can be mailed or hand delivered. Any form of written communication (letter or postcard) or the official application form is acceptable. A family member can also apply for someone.

People can vote by absentee ballot if they will be absent from the town on Election Day, have a

physical disability that prevents their voting at the polling location, or cannot vote at the polls due to religious beliefs.

A person can vote at the clerk's office or request that the ballot be mailed to them.

GROCERY GAP

Access to supermarkets has nutrition ramifications

Two North Shore communities made the Top 10 list of cities with the highest percentage of low-income residents lacking access to supermarkets, according to a new report.

Lynn and Revere joined Brockton, Chelsea, Chicopee, Everett, Lawrence, Lowell, Springfield and Taunton as cities with a problem that has nutrition ramifications.

The so-called grocery-gap is most acute in older Bay State cities and rural areas, according to the Food Trust, a Philadelphia-based national nonprofit. The study's authors' mission is to ensure everyone has access to affordable and nutritious food.

The data measured the percentage of residents living more than a mile from a grocery store. To meet the standard definition of a supermarket, researchers said the stores must have annual sales of \$2 million or more.

Lynn has two major supermarkets: Shaw's on State Street and Stop & Shop on Washington Street. There's also a Price Rite on the Lynnway.

But the study failed to include the new 84,000-square-foot Market Basket which is expected to open this summer. The \$25 million store is nearing competition at the General Electric Factory of the Future site on Western Avenue.

The lack of grocery stores affects 2.8 million people in Massachusetts, including more than 700,000 children and about 523,000 senior citizens, the survey said.

Fuel assistance deadline extended

It may be warm now, but winter is sure to return.

Lynn Economic Opportunity (LEO), the city's community action agency, has extended its deadline for fuel assistance. The last day to apply is Friday, May 12.

LEO serves 3,000 households with fuel help and weatherization. That number could double with the amount of low-income clients who are likely eligible, but have yet to see if they qualify.

The nonprofit assists

households in Lynn, Lynnfield, Nahant, Saugus, Swampscott, and Wakefield. No matter the type of fuel used to heat the home, tenants or homeowners may apply.

Once qualified for the fuel assistance program, there are many other services to help manage the home. The weatherization and conservation team can perform a home energy audit to find ways to keep your home comfortable year-round. They can

save money and energy with "green" lightbulbs, insulation, furnace repair, and even new appliances.

LEO encourages anyone who had a hard time staying warm this winter, or had difficulty paying utility bills, to visit the office at 156 Broad St., and see if their services are right for you.

LEO's mission is to alleviate the impact of poverty while providing ways to financial stability for individuals and families.

Lynn listed among top spots to live

It took a while, but *The Boston Globe* has discovered Lynn's real estate boomlet.

In a Sunday Magazine feature on Easter, the city was listed in its "Top Spots to Live: 12 Communities with Soaring Home Prices."

The piece, under a photo of the former Daily Item building, cited data from The Warren Group. It showed the median price for a single-family home in Lynn has swelled by 59 percent since 2011 to \$287,000. Condominium prices climbed to \$180,00, up 67 percent during the same period.

There's a quote from "Johnny," a potential buyer who said what brings him to Lynn is price, value, affordability and space.

"We've broadened from potentially a condo in East Boston," he told the *Globe*. "I'd rather drive farther to have a single-family home and have more space and a yard."

Also quoted is Jay Ash, the state's Secretary of Housing and Economic Development, who said Lynn is one of those "gritty blue-collar North Shore communities that are poised to move up a notch or two or three."

He should know. Ash, a Chelsea native who served as its city manager for years, has been credited with revitalizing the city just outside of Boston.

"Snap up a single-family for less than \$300,000 and start brushing up on your do-it-yourself skills," the *Globe* implores.

Have you no decency, corporate America?

WASHINGTON — Thomas Demetrio is a Chicago lawyer who looks like he just stepped out of one of Irvin S. Cobb's folksy "Old Judge Priest" stories for the Saturday Evening Post. You could also say he resembles real-life attorney Joseph Welch, who during the Army-McCarthy hearings, famously asked Sen. Joseph McCarthy, "Have you no sense of decency, sir?"

Demetrio effectively asked the same of corporate America the other day as he addressed questions about how he planned to represent Dr. David Dao over treatment from United Airlines for what even that major carrier's CEO concedes was unacceptable — the thug-like removal of the 69-year-old MD from a UAL plane. The challenge to the airline's behavior is just beginning. Dao's attorney has said a suit would not be filed until all "due diligence" is finished.

In case you have forgone any association with the new world of technology or the old one of print and television and missed the much-publicized incident, Dao was summarily hauled from the seat he had paid for because the flight was overbooked and United needed his seat for a crew member. The doctor said he would not give up his seat to Louisville because he needed to see patients the next day.

Whether a trial ever takes place is another matter. United has moved to placate other passengers on the plane who witnessed the affair and were outraged. And evidence showing Dao was injured and

will need facial surgery and other medical treatment has been mounting, meaning a very large settlement could come before a drawn-out court fight.

While the law gives United certain advantages in thinning overbooked flights, the court of public opinion is clearly on Dao's side, and damage to the airline's reputation could be significant.

What's more, Demetrio and his client seem in a mood to make this a broader issue. Demetrio made that clear in a measured, eloquent statement to the press that simply cited the need for corporate America to treat those who are its clients with dignity.

Those who fly regularly know exactly what he is saying. Passengers face accelerated prices and less service and terminals that not only bustle but trample. Planes are overcrowded and made far more uncomfortable by crammed overheads and seats too close together as the carriers seek higher and higher profits.

All this leads to an atmosphere of tension and intimidation between passengers and airline employees who tolerate no disagreement and often magnify the gravity of the situation. The passenger is seldom right under any condition. The constant fear of some terrorist event has worsened the entire experience.

I recently witnessed an incident involving a passenger who had just received an order from his company to change his flight for an urgent meeting elsewhere. He waited in line and explained

calmly and politely to the gate agent that he needed, if possible, to retrieve his bags that had been checked on the first flight. He was told by the agent he did not have the time to deal with his problem. The passenger asked again for the agent's help and was rebuffed. Finally, the frustrated passenger raised his voice and demanded to see a supervisor. At that point, the agent summoned security, and the man was led away pleading.

Perhaps nothing could have been done about the man's baggage, but the situation was exacerbated by the agent's bad judgment and rudeness.

Who knows how far Dao will decide to take this case.

One can only believe the episode has already shaken the airline industry to its core and will bring a realization of how far we have slipped since the days when the customer truly mattered. Let's hope it won't soon be forgotten.

Chaos at the carnival

Revere's annual spring carnival is a well-intentioned effort that may have made its final appearance at the Showcase Cinema complex following Sunday's gunshot incident.

Fortunately, no one was hurt or killed after shots were fired Easter evening, shattering glass in cars parked in the Showcase parking lot.

Social media descriptions of the shooting's immediate aftermath described "mass hysteria erupting" as frightened carnival-goers fled to the street, children in tow, or covered inside the cinema under orders from police who, according to news reports, were initially told the person responsible for the shooting hid inside a theater.

The Easter gunfire bears similarities to the 2015 incident at the carnival that resulted in three arrests. A Revere police lieutenant described how the 2015 incident escalated "almost to the point where the crowd got completely out of control."

The 2015 disturbance and Sunday night's gunfire drew police officers from Revere and surrounding communities who poured into the parking lot, some armed with assault weapons. Traffic backed up in Copeland Circle as police blocked off the exit to the cinema complex, and carnival and moviegoers, their holiday evenings abruptly terminated, made their way on foot through the circle and down Squire Road.

Mayor Brian Arrigo interrupted his Patriots Day Monday to declare city officials are evaluating the carnival's future inside Revere city limits. He praised the police response and the crowd's overall calm demeanor, calling the chaos that followed the shooting "hectic and confusing."

Arrigo knows the nightmare his administration and his city could have faced if the shooting resulted in a stampeding crowd and fatalities. The image of panicked people pouring onto the streets with wailing children is enough to fill television screens for days and send cold chills down an elected official's spine.

Sadly, the repeated problems plaguing the carnival are dooming a great cause. The carnival operated on the Showcase lot for three weeks without significant problems until its last night literally ended with a bang.

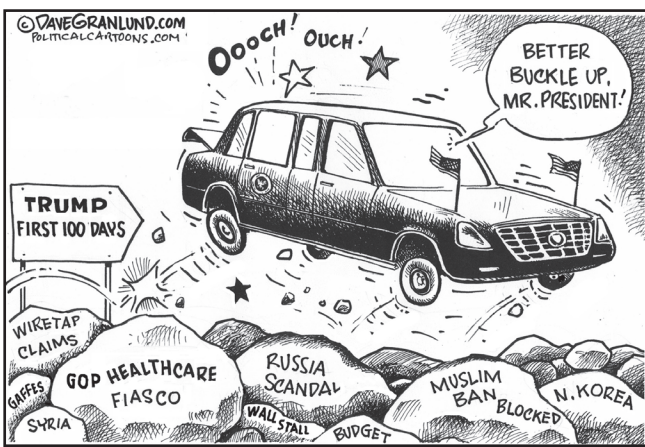
Carnival proceeds help support the McCarthy-Trifone Recreation Committee's assistance to seven local Revere youth organizations. Carnival producer Fiesta Shows, Showcase and the committee work together to help kids.

The shooting is a classic example of a bad incident by one person or a few ruining a good time for many people who just wanted to wrap up the Easter weekend with a movie or a little warm weather fun.

Arrigo will be acting as a prudent city leader if he decides the carnival cannot make a repeat performance in 2018 on the Showcase parking lot. Public safety may dictate that it be replaced by a smaller, more manageable event.

Another way to make the carnival safer is to make it a truly home-grown event with participation from a large number of Revere residents. Separating the carnival with adequate security measures from the Showcase Cinema complex and giving residents a role with police in keeping the carnival safe might go a long way to removing fear, chaos and confusion from the annual event.

The spring carnival is a fun tradition benefiting a great cause. But the carnival's return to Revere next year will depend on more people taking responsibility to make it safer and more family oriented.



Affidavit: Doc prescribed Prince opioids under friend's name

MINNEAPOLIS — Court documents unsealed Monday in the investigation into Prince's death suggest a doctor and a close friend helped him improperly obtain prescription opioid painkillers, but they shed no new light on how the superstar got the fentanyl that killed him.

The affidavits and search warrants were unsealed in Carver County District Court as the yearlong investigation into Prince's death continues. The documents show authorities searched Paisley Park, cell-phone records of Prince's associates, and Prince's email accounts to try to determine how he got the fentanyl, a synthetic opioid drug 50 times more powerful than heroin.

The documents don't

reveal answers to that question, but do provide the most details yet seen on Prince's struggle with addiction to prescription opioids in the days before he died.

Prince was 57 when he was found alone and unresponsive in an elevator at his Paisley Park estate on April 21. Just six days earlier, he fell ill on a plane and had to be revived with

two doses of a drug that reverses the effects of an opioid overdose.

Associates at Paisley Park also told investigators that Prince was recently "going through withdrawals, which are believed to be the result of the abuse of prescription medication."

The documents unsealed Monday allege Dr. Michael Todd Schulenberg, a family physician who saw the musician twice last April, told authorities he prescribed the opioid painkiller oxycodone to Prince but put it under the name of Prince's bodyguard and close friend, Kirk Johnson, "for Prince's privacy," one affidavit said.

Schulenberg's attorney, Amy Connors, disputed that. She said in a statement that Schulenberg "never directly prescribed opioids to Prince, nor did he ever prescribe opioids to any other person with

the intent that they would be given to Prince."

F. Clayton Tyler, Johnson's attorney, released a statement saying that after reviewing the documents, "we believe that it is clear that Kirk Johnson did not secure nor supply the drugs which caused Prince's death."

Schulenberg is practicing family medicine in Minnesota and Connors said there are no restrictions on his license.

It is illegal for a doctor to write a prescription for someone under another person's name.

Joe Tamburino, a Minnesota defense attorney who is not associated with the Prince case, said while Schulenberg and Johnson could face charges if the allegations are true, it's unlikely state or federal prosecutors would pursue them. He called them low-level offenses that

wouldn't draw prison time.

He said for prosecutors, the source of the fentanyl is the big target.

"The oxycodone in this case is only tangential to the whole case," Tamburino said. "If this was a fentanyl script, oh boy, it would be a totally different situation. ... The real meat and potatoes is going to be that fentanyl thing."

The documents said Prince did not have any prescriptions, including for fentanyl.

James L. Jones, a spokesman for the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration's field office in Chicago, said anyone convicted of writing a prescription for someone under another person's name could lose their DEA registration — meaning they could no longer prescribe medications — and could face discipline from their state medical board.

Gorsuch dives into the fray at first SJC arguments

WASHINGTON — Justice Neil Gorsuch dove into the public side of his new job Monday, piping up early and often as he took his seat on the Supreme Court bench for the first time to hear arguments.

The new justice waited just 11 minutes before asking questions in the first of three cases the court heard Monday, its first session since President Donald Trump's pick was sworn in one week earlier.

The 49-year-old Gorsuch echoed his own confirmation hearing testimony with questions focused on the text of federal laws and rules at issue before the court. He employed a bit of humor, expressed a modicum of humility, showed a hint of irritation and even channeled Justice Antonin Scalia, the man he replaced, with a touch of sarcasm.

"Wouldn't it be a lot easier if we just followed the plain text of the statute?" Gorsuch asked during the

first argument, a highly technical case about which court federal employees go to with some discrimination claims.

That question sounded a lot like the answer Gorsuch gave last month, when he was pressed to defend an opinion he wrote against a fired trucker. "Senator, all I can tell you is my job is to apply the law you write," he said then.

While some of the other justices slouched, rocked back in their chairs or leaned their chin or forehead on their hands, Gorsuch sat straight in his high-backed chair, to the far left of Chief Justice John Roberts.

The justices sit by order of seniority, with the two longest-serving members of the court flanking the chief justice. The two newest justices sit on either end of the bench. The justices had removed one chair from the bench after Scalia died more than 14 months ago. Monday's session was the first since then with the ninth chair restored, and nine justices present.

Trump talks tough in warning North Korea: Kim 'gotta behave'

PANMUNJOM, South Korea — The White House displayed a tough and unyielding approach to North Korea and its nuclear ambitions Monday, with President Donald Trump warning that Kim Jong Un has "gotta behave" and Vice President Mike Pence sternly advising Kim not to test America's resolve and military power.

Trump, in Washington, and Pence at the tense Demilitarized Zone between North and South Korea, signaled a forceful U.S. stance on North Korea's recent actions and threats. But no one was predicting what might come next.

Behind the heated rhetoric, in fact, Trump's strategy in the region looks somewhat similar to predecessor Barack Obama's — albeit with the added unpredictability of a new

president who has shown he's willing to use force.

Pence, inspecting the DMZ, warned Pyongyang that after years of testing the U.S. and South Korea with its nuclear ambitions, "the era of strategic patience is over." Appearing later with South Korea's acting president, Hwang Kyo-ahn, the vice president pointed to Trump's recent military actions in Syria and Afghanistan as signs that the new administration would not shrink from acting against the North.

"North Korea would do well not to test his resolve — or the strength of the armed forces of the United States in this region," Pence said at the start of a 10-day trip to Asia.

Pence's remarks also came with hope for a diplomatic path. Washington, he said, was looking for security "through peaceable means, through negotiations."

In the meantime, North

Korea's deputy U.N. ambassador accused the United States of turning the Korean peninsula into "the world's biggest hotspot" and creating "a dangerous situation in which a thermonuclear war may break out at any moment."

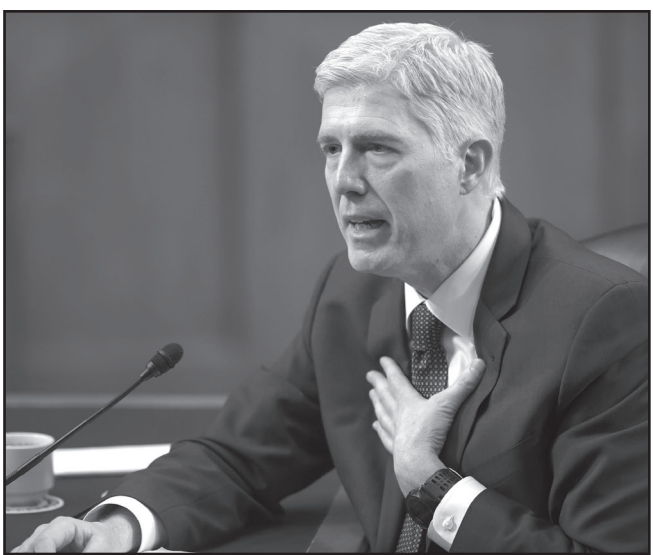
Kim In Ryong told a news conference Monday that U.S.-South Korean military exercises being staged now are the largest-ever "aggressive war drill." He said North Korea's measures to bolster its nuclear forces are self-defensive "to cope with the U.S. vicious nuclear threat and blackmail," and he said his country "is ready to react to any mode of war desired by the U.S."

America's implied threat of force isn't new, nor is hope for engagement. Previous presidents have repeatedly left all options on the table while trying to enlist China's help to pressure North Korea to pursue diplomatic solutions.

The Trump administration has labeled this policy "maximum pressure and engagement," although officials acknowledge there is no current engagement with Pyongyang.

Until recently, it has been Trump's confrontational tone that has drawn attention rather than his action. But then he ordered the unilateral missile strike against Syria, even after dismissing talk of deeper U.S. involvement in that nation's civil war.

"There is both greater unpredictability and decisiveness from President Trump," said Victor Cha, the director of Asian Studies at Georgetown University and a former adviser to President George W. Bush. Cha noted Pence's reference to "strategic patience," an Obama administration strategy in which diplomatic and economic pressure from sanctions were given time to change the North's behavior.

Experienced hiker swept away in Grand Canyon along with teen

PHOENIX — A woman who was swept down a backcountry creek in Grand Canyon National Park along with her step-grandson is an experienced hiker and married to a founder of a popular outdoor footwear company, family members said Monday.

Authorities were searching for Jackson Standefer, 14, and Lou-Ann Merrell, 62, wife of Randy Merrell, who helped found the Merrell Boot Co. in 1981. The pair lost their footing Saturday and fell into the water during a family trip with Randy Merrell and the boy's mother in a remote area of the Arizona park.

The other two alerted officials by setting off an emergency GPS locator beacon below the canyon's North Rim, said Chief Ranger Matt Vandzura of the National Park Service. He didn't identify the hikers.

Mark McOmie, Jackson's uncle, told The Associated Press that the Merrells were avid hikers and knew the area well.

Lou-Ann Merrell is "a very experienced backpacker," McOmie said. "If they can get to a spot where they cannot be in the water and stay warm, she's got the skills needed to get them through it. The odds aren't great. But given their skills and knowledge of the area, that will probably lead to the best possible out-

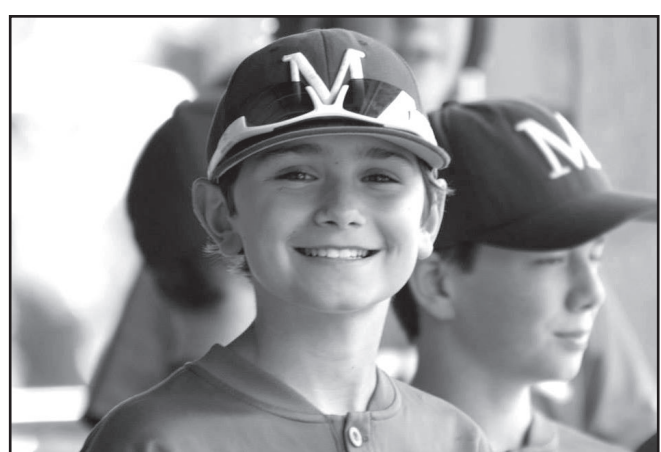

come."

McOmie said searchers have found both their backpacks and their be-

longings inside, which the family has interpreted with mixed feelings. On the one hand, he said, it

looks as if they were able to get their backpacks off.

"The bad part is that they don't have their gear," McOmie said.

The McCallie School in Chattanooga, Tenn., said Jackson was an eighth-grade student at the all-boys school.

"The entire McCallie community sends its prayers to the Standefer family and all those close to Jackson as we all hope for a positive ending to this situation," the school said in a statement.

The park service said it's too early in the investigation to determine what went wrong. No rain or flash flooding was reported in the area, but it was not known whether the water level was higher than usual in Tapeats

Creek, a tributary of the Colorado River that runs through the Arizona landmark.

Creeks in the canyon often see higher water levels in the spring as snow melts, Vandzura said.

The park service describes conditions in the area on its website, warning that melting snow or heavy rain may make crossing the creek impossible.

It also said hikers can use a "sketchy, seldom-used trail" that lets them walk around the creek when the water is high, but that the path should be used only as a last resort.

The group was on a different path known as Tapeats Trail, authorities said.

Revere police take aim at distracted driving

REVERE — The Revere Police Department will conduct a series of patrols designed to reduce the number of crashes, fatalities and injuries caused by distracted driving, Mayor Brian Arrigo and Police Chief Joseph Cafarelli announced.

The effort is part of a statewide enforcement and education campaign by the Highway Safety Division of the Executive Office of Public Safety and Security to address a historic rise in fatal crashes fueled by driver distraction, police said.

The campaign is designed to raise awareness of the importance of attentive and engaged driving and will focus on the dangers distracted driving poses to everyone on the road, including bicyclists and pedestrians, police said.

"Our goal is keeping all road users in our community safe," said Cafarelli in

a statement. "If you text, dial, or read a message on your phone while driving, you are endangering the lives of those around you, and you will be stopped. Using our community's crash data, our officers will determine where the majority of crashes occur and focus their patrols in those areas."

State law prohibits adult drivers from writing, sending or reading electronic messages, interacting with apps or browsing the Internet while driving, even if stopped at a light. Teen drivers under 18 are prohibited entirely from using mobile phones and other electronic devices while driving. Fines are up to \$500. Teen drivers can also lose their license for up to a year, police said.

Revere Police are offering tips for motorists: Turn your phone off and put it where you can't reach it before driving; let your friends and family

know that you'll be driving and can't take their call/text; pull over to a safe place if you have to make a call or send a text; start GPS navigation or review maps before you start driving; watch for pedestrians and bicyclists, especially at night; and remember to buckle up as seat belts are your best defense against a distracted driver.

Stats from the Fatality Analysis Reporting System (FARS) show that there has been a 13 percent state increase in motor vehicle fatalities from 2015 to 2016, more than double the national average.

In 2015, according to the National Highway Safety Administration, fatalities from crashes involving a distracted driver increased by 9 percent. In Massachusetts, according to FARS, distracted driving fatalities are highest among ages 18-34 and 75 or older.

Man accused of Facebook video killing said he 'just snapped'

CLEVELAND — In a rambling video, Steve Stephens said, "I snapped, I just snapped." But as the manhunt dragged on Monday for the man accused of posting Facebook footage of himself killing a retiree, police were unable to explain what set him off.

"Only Steve knows that," Cleveland police Chief Calvin Williams said as authorities posted a \$50,000 reward for Stephens' capture in the shooting of Robert Godwin Sr., a 74-year-old former foundry worker.

In the video, Stephens blamed a former girlfriend he had lived with, saying he woke up last week and "couldn't take it anymore." But in a statement Monday, the woman shed little light on what might have gone wrong and said Stephens was good to her and her children.

As for the shooting victim, Godwin appeared to have been selected at random, gunned down while picking up aluminum cans Sunday afternoon after spending Easter with some of his children.

A manhunt that started in Cleveland's gritty east side expanded rapidly into a nationwide search for Stephens, a 37-year-old job counselor who worked with teens and young adults, police said.

"He could be nearby. He could be far away or anywhere in between," FBI agent Stephen Anthony said.

Law enforcement officials said his cellphone

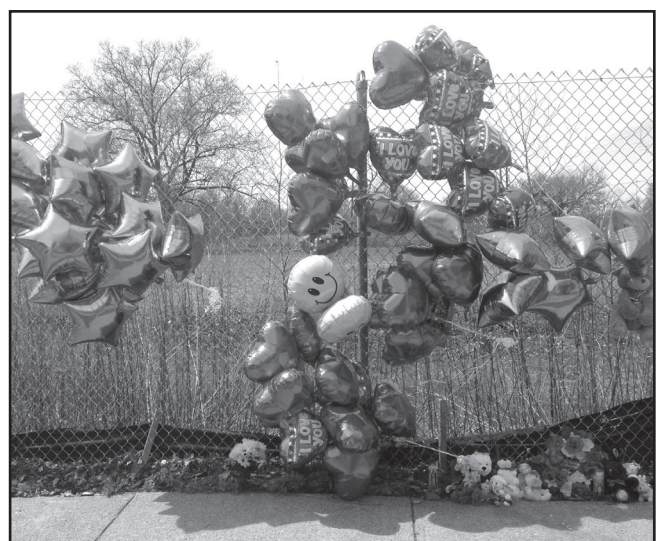

signal was last detected on Sunday afternoon in Erie, Pa., about 100 miles east of Cleveland.

Police reported getting dozens and dozens of tips, and nine schools in Philadelphia were locked down Monday while authorities investigated possible sightings of Stephens. But they said there was no sign he was actually there.

Some of those who know Stephens described him as pleasant and kind, while some said he had a gambling problem. He filed for bankruptcy two years ago.

In another video posted to Facebook, Stephens said that he gambled away everything and that he and his girlfriend had planned to marry but didn't, without saying why.

"He got along with everybody, so it's just unbelievable what happened," said Alexis Lee, a friend

who saw Stephens last week.

The police chief said: "We are not going to pinpoint a specific thing and say this is what triggered this, because we don't know."

Godwin's daughter said he was killed while collecting cans in a plastic shopping bag.

"Not because he needed the money, it was just something he did," said 52-year-old Debbie Godwin. "That's all he was doing. He wasn't harming anyone."

She said her father, who had 10 children, was a gentle man with nothing mean about him.

Dozens of family, friends and community members gathered Monday evening in Cleveland for a vigil to remember Godwin. They hugged and comforted each other, while urging an end to the violence on their city streets.

Judge dismisses rape charge against former 49er

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — A Santa Clara County judge has dismissed a rape charge against former San Francisco 49er Ray McDonald after prosecutors said the woman who made the allegation refused to testify.

Judge David A. Cena dismissed the charge — one count of rape of an intoxicated person — on Monday. Santa Clara County prosecutor Chris Lamiero said in a statement he tried to convince the victim to testify, but she refused.

The woman said she slipped and fell on a pool deck at McDonald's San Jose home in December 2014 and continued to fall after that because of her initial head injury and alcohol consumption. She accused McDonald of carrying her upstairs to his bedroom and sexually assaulting her.

McDonald faced a maximum of eight years in prison.

Lawsuit: Army should factor PTSD in discharge decisions

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — A federal lawsuit filed Monday alleges the U.S. Army has issued less-than-honorable discharges for potentially thousands of service members without adequately considering the effects of post-traumatic stress disorder and other mental health conditions.

The plaintiffs, two Army veterans from Connecticut who fought in Iraq and Afghanistan, say in the lawsuit that they were wrongly denied honorable discharges. The lawsuit filed in Connecticut by Yale Law School Veterans Legal Services Clinic is seeking class-action status.

An Army spokeswoman said the branch doesn't comment on pending

litigation.

Man who vanished after game is found dead in river

BOSTON (AP) — A Massachusetts man who vanished after attending a Boston Celtics game more than two weeks ago has been found dead in a river.

State police say they pulled the body from the Charles River on Sunday morning after a passer-by spotted it. Police on Monday confirmed it was that of 23-year-old Michael Kelleher, of Southborough.

Kelleher's parents said in a statement: "Michael was claimed by the Charles River the night of his disappearance. At 8:00 this morning, the river gave him back to us."

His parents also thanked everyone who helped in the search.

Kelleher was last seen March 29 after attending a Celtics game with a friend.

Search for two men missing in national park suspended

PORT ANGELES, Wash. (AP) — Officials have suspended their search for two men missing in Washington state's Olympic National Park, including a 20-year-old hiker from New Jersey missing for the past week.

Zach Krull, from Livingston, New Jersey, had been camping alone at Staircase, in the park's southeastern corner, when he was reported overdue April 10.

Search teams were hindered by bad weather and severe avalanche danger. Teams on Friday night did see footprints that entered an area hit by a slide, but couldn't confirm the prints were Krull's, The Peninsula Daily News reported.

Over the weekend more than 70 people searched

the area, including air support from Whidbey Island and King County, said Mason County Sheriff's Lt. Jason Dracoby.

Krull recently transferred to The Evergreen State College in Olympia and wanted to become a park ranger, said his father, Stewart Krull. He's also a skilled photographer, a music producer and a Mets fan, he said.

"He had visited and went camping in the northern Cascades and fell in love with Washington," his father said. "He is very much a person in tune with the wilderness and is never happier than when he's in the outdoors."

Zach Krull was well-equipped for what was supposed to be a weekend trip, but he did not have an avalanche beacon.

"I think his enthusiasm just got the better of him and he didn't know how treacherous Olympic National Park and Olympic National Forest can be," his father said.

Officials have also called off a search for 22-year-old Jacob Gray, of Bellevue, Washington, who went missing April 5.

His bicycle and trailer full of camping gear were found on the road to the Sol Duc hot springs.

About 30 people searched for Gray over the weekend in teams led by Clallam County Search and Rescue, said Clallam County Sheriff's Chief Criminal Deputy Brian King. They used three cadaver and scent dogs to search the area, but found no evidence of Gray, he said.

“Krystle was a three-year member of the softball team when she was at Medford High and we thought it was fitting to honor her memory since her passing,” Dempsey said. “Our softball team looks forward to this tournament every (year) and the Medford community and the local businesses really get behind it. It’s a fantastic weekend for a great cause.”

This year will be the first anniversary of the unveiling of the \$1.2 million Krystle Campbell Peace Garden in Medford. Initiated by former Medford Mayor Michael J. McGlynn, the memorial on Riverside Avenue was funded by state and federal grants, along with private donations.

Fourteen months in the making, the garden was

unveiled in September 2016 with Medford Mayor Stephanie M. Burke, McGlynn, state Transportation Secretary Stephanie Pollack, and others in attendance.

William Campbell said his family was deeply moved by the tribute to his daughter. “She was a beautiful lady,” he said. “Just a beautiful lady. She would come to a place like this.”

The garden was designed to replicate the marathon course, with bronze plaques identifying many of the mile markers. A central seating area faces four fountains which represent the four fatalities (the fourth victim, officer Sean Collier, was killed during the search for the suspects), surrounding a fifth fountain for the more than 250 who were injured; a number of whom were grievously injured and lost limbs. Plaques representing the lives of the four killed were installed as the four points on a compass.

An April 8 ceremony at

the garden and luncheon at the adjacent Medford Senior Center included the presentation of \$5,000 scholarships to two UMAss Boston students: Leona Smith of Revere and Eden Blakeley of Dorchester. Both plan to pursue their education at Krystle Campbell’s alma mater.

Seven runners who ran Monday’s marathon in Krystle Campbell’s honor gathered outside Medford City Hall, dressed in yel-

low, long-sleeved shirts and bright blue tank tops bearing her name.

A mile run through Medford passed by the Campbell family home. Burke, in remarks at the April 8 luncheon, said \$680,000 of a \$1 million goal had already been raised for the scholarship fund.

“We will continue to remember Krystle in her home city of Medford,” Burke said. “We will always honor her legacy.”

Mourners gather to take a stance against violence

at 25 Exchange St. on Sunday around 3 p.m.

The community vigil was organized by Lynn Museum/LynnArts, headed by executive director Drew Russo. Residents gathered in front of the LynnArts building on Monday night to light a candle for the victims, and stand against the senseless acts of violence in the community.

Police are seeking a male shooter who left the scene. Police have not identified a suspect and no arrests have been made, authorities said.

The Essex County District Attorney’s office identified the man killed as Leonardo Clement, 46, of Lynn. Clement was taken to Union Hospital where he was pronounced dead. Another victim, a 41-year-old man was taken to Massachusetts General Hospital and is expected to survive.

Both men attended Zion Baptist Church and East Coast International Church, according to the respective pastors, Rev. Annie Belmer and Rev. David Urbina. The pastors

identified the second victim as Prince Belin.

Belmer said that her last memory of the men is on Easter, when they were both dressed up and happy, at the service at Zion Baptist Church. She said Clement was legally blind and was very involved in the community. She said he was a nice, meek and humble person.

Urbina said the men attended East Coast International Church as well. They came to the church’s service on Sunday, right before going to Zion, he added.

“I remember Lenny had a very gentle spirit,” Urbina said. “He was very docile, very kind.”

Urbina said he visited Belin at the hospital on Monday, and that he was recovering well. “He’s just a very lively, very happy person,” he said.

Urbina said his heart was broken because he knew the two men who were assaulted, and struggled to find the right words to describe how he felt after he heard the news come in. His spirit was disturbed and he couldn’t believe it, he said.

“But there was also, the

words of the people describing these events and these reports and the rumors, this overall sense of hopelessness, this overall sense of, well, this is just what happens in our city, and that began to disturb me even more,” Urbina said.

Russo said he felt it was important “after violence visited our doorstep to pull people from the community together in consolation for the lives that were lost.” He said it was an opportunity to stand strong against the violence, console each other, and “move forward in the work that we’re all trying so hard to do improve and make better the quality of life in this community, and the small part that we play in this downtown neighborhood in that doing that through arts and culture.”

City Councilor Peter Capano said, “these senseless tragedies do not reflect on the work that’s being done down here,” and “this is our city. We’re going to take this city back.”

“One of the things, regardless of what goes on around us, what goes on in our city, what we do not

expect, what we do not look for is violence, community violence to take place in our cultural district,” Belmer said. “This is a sanctuary in our city, so one thing that we will not tolerate here in the city of Lynn, and especially in the district where our young people come so that they can learn how to sing, they can learn how to dance, they learn art, they learn music.

“We will not have that cut off because parents are afraid to bring their children here. So, one thing that we will not have, we will not tolerate, is community violence. We will not tolerate that. What we want in our city is peace and we are going to do something about it. So, you really stepped in the wrong community. You came to the wrong place, because right now something is going to be done about it. It will not go unresolved. So, we want any and everybody that’s here to take that message back, that it will not take place in our city any longer.”

“Thank you to the first responders from Revere and surrounding communities who rushed to the scene, and thank you to the guests at the carnival and those at the movie theater for their patience and cooperation during a hectic and confusing situation.”

Police responded to a report of shots fired around 8:40 p.m. No victims have been reported but three vehicles were damaged, according to Police Lt. Amy O’Hara. There was a report that a suspect may have fled into the movie theater, which was evacuated.

Since police have not determined whether the shooter was visiting the cinema or the carnival, City Councilors Anthony Zambuto and Arthur Guinasso said they weren’t comfortable commenting on what the shooting meant for the future of the carnival.

“I’m not certain if it’s attributed to the carnival or to Showcase Cinema,” said Guinasso. “There was obviously some incident of gun play and that’s completely unacceptable, no matter what. Once the

police department makes a determination about the cause, we can pass judgment.”

E.J. Dean, vice president of operations of Dean & Flynn, Inc., also called Fiesta Shows, said he was deeply saddened by the incident.

“For generations, we have prided ourselves in creating a family-friendly environment and the safety of our guests is our top priority,” Dean said in a statement. “We maintain a large police and fire presence on site as part of our normal security procedures to ensure that our patrons are safe at all times.

“We are pleased that none of our guests or employees were injured in this incident, which took place outside the confines of our carnival event, but we are nonetheless providing any assistance we can to the Revere Police and Showcase Theaters regarding this matter. We feel bad for the good citizens and families of Revere that were enjoying their time at the carnival when this occurred.”

Nahant Town Meeting chases ambulances

Meeting support the article, stating “revenues aside, the benefit to residents of an Ambulance Enterprise Fund is questionable, and there is no urgency to doing it now.”

The document also noted that in 2016, the Fire Department responded to only 18 fires, 360 ambulance runs, and 62 assists to invalids, a pattern that has been consistent for years.

“Last year the town voted to lease an ambulance, which arrived at the end of 2016,” the report states. “Despite that vote, the ambulance was actually purchased via short-term

debt at 6 percent interest. In addition, the department’s acquisition of unplanned and unbudgeted assets (i.e. a drone), raises concerns about making additional funding available outside Proposition 2½ protections.”

Richard Lombard, chairman of the Board of Selectmen, said he is opposed to the article because he fears people will worry about whether they can afford ambulance services and might not call 911 when they need help.

At a meeting last month, Selectman Enzo Barile said fees can be waived for residents with a financial hardship. Barile and Selectman Chesley Taylor Jr. supported the article.

Town Meeting will also discuss the fate of the Coast Guard Housing. First, they will be presented with a vote to rescind a 2008 Town Meeting decision to sell the land for the construction of condominiums. Then they’ll vote to authorize the selectmen to handle selling the four-acre parcel of land and 12 single-family homes.

But the Finance Committee is recommending a vote to indefinitely postpone the article, stating in the report that the town “should not act in haste.”

“The article as written specifies nothing, and it is fiscally irresponsible to approve it as such.”

The Finance Committee also recommended

\$175,000 be allocated to make improvements and repairs to the drainage systems at Bear Pond and Ward Road; \$106,000 to purchase two new pickup trucks for the Department of Public Works; and \$280,000 to maintain, repair, and improve the town’s 11 pumping stations.

Town Meeting members will vote on a total of 41 articles. The meeting begins at 12:30 p.m. at Town Hall.

"It's an extreme honor," said T.I. "I feel like, you know, as a kid, Pac was my favorite rapper since the first time I heard him, and you know, that's the first person I ever, as an artist, hoped to pattern myself after."

Shakur was gunned down in 1996 in Las Vegas at the height of his career. If he were alive today, T.I. thinks he would be more than a musician. "Anything could have happened with Pac, man. Just his diverse intellect, and the way he thought outside the box could have led him anywhere in life," he said. "He may have gotten into politics by now. Who knows?"

T.I. has been active in the community, focusing on youth programs for boys and girls, and feels his role continues to grow when it comes to providing help to those that need it most.

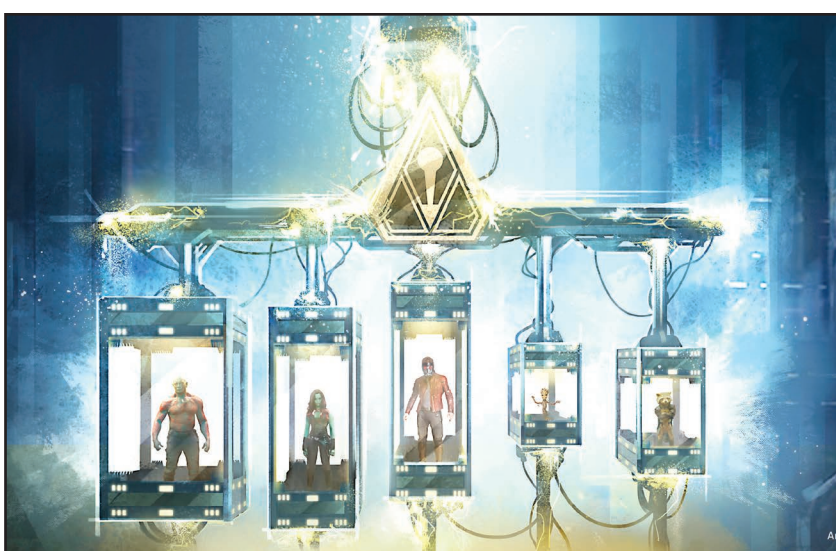

(AP) — Disney theme parks have a big summer ahead of them with major new attractions opening May 27 based on two movies, one about the Marvel Comics superheroes from "Guardians of the Galaxy" and the other about the lush alien world of Pandora from the James Cameron film "Avatar."

The **Guardians of the Galaxy: Mission BREAK-OUT!** attraction opens at Disney California Adventure in Anaheim, Calif.

Pandora — The World of Avatar is a 12-acre land opening at Walt Disney World's Animal Kingdom in Lake Buena Vista, Fla.

But the creative designer behind the attractions says you don't need to know anything about either movie to enjoy them.

"This is not a revisitation of a plot line of a film you already saw," said Disney Imagineer **Joe Rohde** at an event Monday in New York City previewing the attractions. "This is your opportunity to go to an amazing world and have adventures of your own. ... The story is about you."

The premise of the Guardians of the Galaxy ride is that the Guardian superheroes have been captured and riders must participate in an adventure with a character called Rocket Raccoon to free them. "It is a prison breakout story," Rohde said. The ride incorporates multiple scenarios for resolving the story line so that riders have a slightly different experience each time they go through it.

Guardians of the Galaxy is located in a redesigned drop tower structure that once housed the Twilight Zone of Terror.

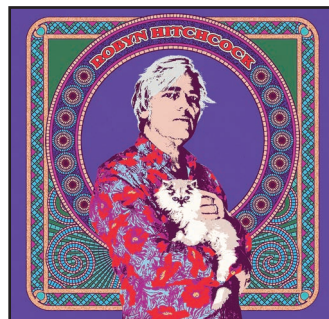

Netflix on the verge of hitting 100 million subscribers

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Netflix is on the verge of surpassing 100 million global subscribers, a testament to how much the video streaming service has changed the entertainment landscape since its debut a decade ago.

The company will reach that milestone this weekend if its projections are correct. Netflix made the prediction Monday with the release of its first-quarter earnings.

The service added nearly 5 million subscribers

during the first three months of the year, and will end March with 98.7 million customers in roughly 190 countries.

Over the past decade, "what really did it for Netflix was the explosion of phones and tablets that allowed people to watch video everywhere," said Wedbush Securities analyst **Michael Pachter**. "But Netflix clearly had a vision before those devices became so ubiquitous."

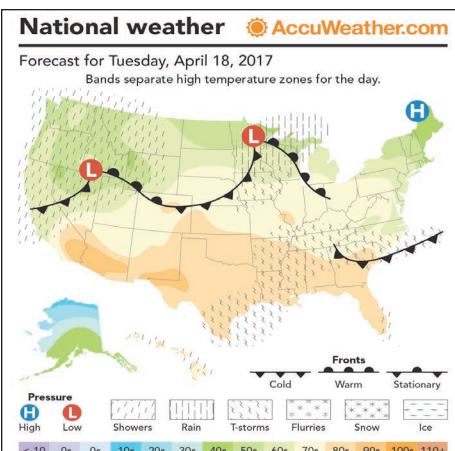

Local runners conquer Boston

BOSTON — And the heat goes on. That simple sentence, and that nifty play on

a popular song from the 1960s, pretty much summed up the 121st running of the Boston Marathon Monday. As Lynn's Karen DiLisio said, "the heat goes on."

Regardless of how any of the local runners fared, the reviews were the same. It was hot.

"I learned — again — that I cannot run in the heat," said Ellen Goldberg of Nahant, who said she struggled to finish in 5:17.43. "But I got through it. You just have to stay focused and see it through."

"The first half of the race it was really hot, and by the time it got cooler, it was too late," she said.

"I decided to save my pride and just finish," said Lynn's Jim Pawlicki, who still finished in 3:34:33, second among Lynners to Peter Gwiliam (3:28:35).

"I got calf cramps at mile 15," Pawlicki said. "I tried to adjust to the warmth that was forecast, and had to back off my pace."

Goldberg, DiLisio and Pawlicki are vets. Kristin Moccia of Lynn is a newbie. And while she didn't know quite what to expect, she feels her 4:41 was a great start.

Moccia, running to benefit Boston Health-Care for the Homeless, had family members and friends strategical-

ly interspersed along the 26.2-mile course for moral support — and it helped.

"I stopped a lot to hug family members," she said. "I'd rather have that experience than finish 20 minutes faster. I felt good about it overall."

However, she, too, was affected by the heat.

"It was tough," she said, "especially the first 13 or so miles. Then, there were a couple of places where I caught some shade, and the tail wind did pick up."

Kristen Holman-Jordan, a former Lynner who was running, along with her brother, Michael, for the Salem Boys & Girls Club, has run marathons ... just not Boston.

"And," she said, "there's a world of difference. I ran out in Sacramento, and there's no comparison between running in California and running in your home, and having people scream your name as you go by. It was just an awesome day."

Allison Gwiliam, a physical therapist who works at New England Baptist Hospital, agreed

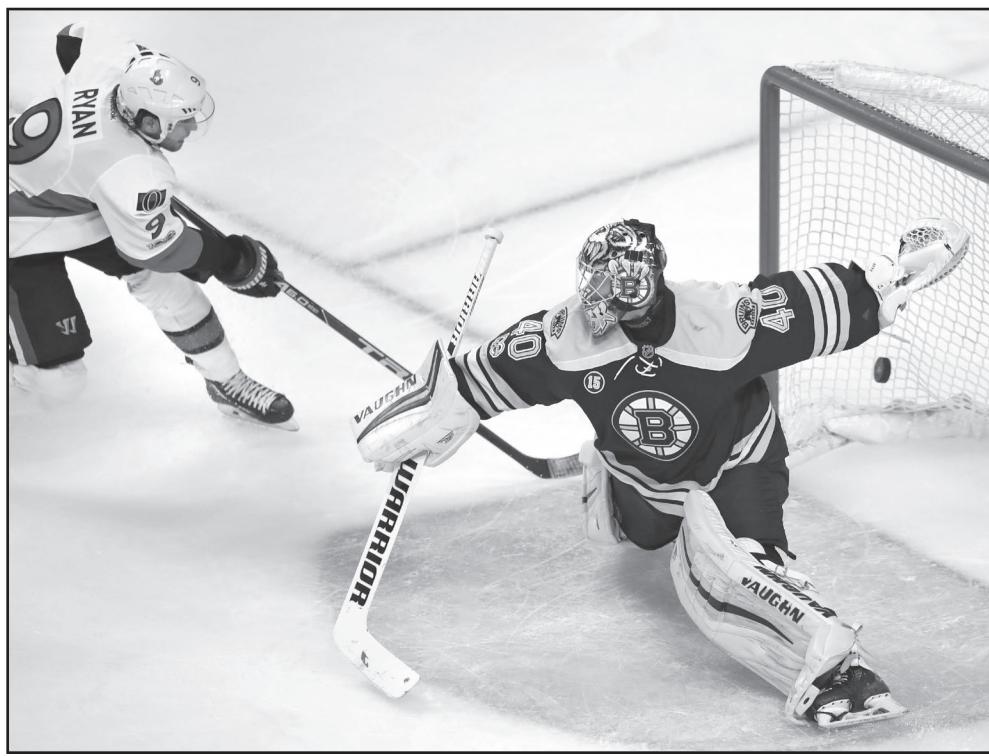
It was the second straight overtime game of the series, and second consecutive win for the Senators following their 4-3 victory in Game 2.

BRIDGE

From a sputnik to a negative

The negative double was devised in 1957 by Al Roth and Tobias Stone. They called it a Sputnik double because the Russians had just launched their satellite. The Roth-Stone version was very loosely defined, but was quickly modified and renamed to show an unbid major. (Why negative? I assume in contrast to a positive double for penalty.)

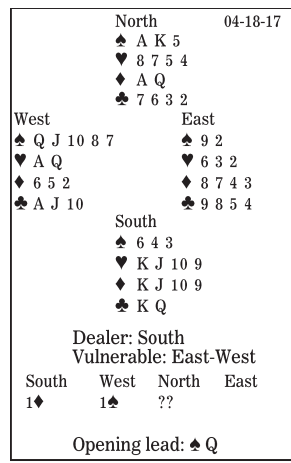
Look at the North hand in the diagram. After partner opens one diamond and West overcalls one spade, what would you do? Without a negative double, presumably North would respond three no-trump, but that contract would have no chance. Instead, North makes a negative double to show four hearts (or five, if he has insufficient values for a two-heart response). South rebids two hearts, and North jumps to four hearts, despite the weakness of his trumps.

What happens after West leads the spade queen?

South has four possible losers: one spade (on the third round), two hearts and one club. He can afford to play one round of trumps, but when West takes the trick and

returns another spade, declarer must win on the board, cash the diamond ace, overtake the diamond queen with his king and play the diamond jack, discarding the spade five from the dummy. Then South leads another trump. Shortly, he will claim, having lost only two hearts and one club.

Did you notice a defensive point? Assuming declarer starts with a heart to his jack, if West wins smoothly with his ace and leads a second spade, he might lull declarer into a false sense of security. If South immediately repeats the heart finesse, he goes down.

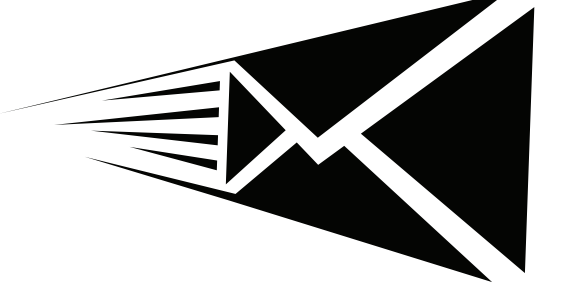

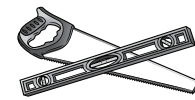

HARPURSVILLE, N.Y. (AP) — The long-awaited arrival of April the giraffe's baby in upstate New York has made Animal Adventure Park the second most live-viewed channel in YouTube's history.

YouTube says April's livestream had more than 232 million live views and 7.6 billion minutes of live watch time since February, second only to League of Legends eSports, which has been around since 2012.

Trump welcomes 21,000 to his first Easter Egg Roll

WASHINGTON — Opening his first White House Easter Egg Roll, President Donald Trump extolled the strength of America as thousands of kids, and some adults, reveled in the time-honored tradition of rolling hard-boiled eggs across the manicured lawn in his back yard.

"This is the 139th Easter Egg Roll. Think of it, 139," Trump said Monday, welcoming families to the annual event, which was dampened by intermittent rain. "And we will be stronger and bigger and better as a nation than ever before. We're right on track," he said, speaking of the nation's strength under fewer than 100 days of his leadership.

Trump's wife, Melania, and their son, Barron, 11, and the Easter Bunny joined him on a balcony overlooking the expansive lawn before they went downstairs to join some of the 21,000 people who were expected to attend what is the biggest social event every year at the White House.

Before joining the festivities with his family, Trump thanked his wife for "working on this for a long time to make it perfect."

There was, however,

some speculation about whether the Trumps would be able to pull off a successful "egg-stravaganza." Planning seemed to get off to a late start, with the Trumps taking longer than in previous years to announce Monday's date.

Both Trump and the first lady have been slow to fill White House jobs, and at least one regular egg roll vendor took to Twitter, the president's favorite social medium, to remind

the White House that a deadline for ordering the wooden eggs that are given out as souvenirs was approaching.

But the egg rolling event, which dates to 1878, wouldn't be made to disappear. It was just made smaller, down from the 35,000 people who got tickets last year, but retaining such activities as a reading nook, an area to send messages to U.S. troops and an entertain-

ment stage.

"As we renew this tradition, thank you for joining us," the first lady said.

Moments later, Trump blew a whistle three times, each time sending groups of youngsters scurrying to deftly use a wooden spoon to maneuver their dyed egg several yards across the finish line. He, the first lady and Barron also joined kids at a table to color cards to send to U.S. service members.

Stocks jump after strong report from China

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks bounced back from recent losses Monday after the Chinese government said that country's economy grew at a slightly faster pace in the first quarter. Banks jumped as interest rates recovered.

After losses in three of the last four weeks, stocks had their best day in more than a month. The largest gains went to industries that would benefit the most from faster global economic growth.

Among banks, the leaders included M&T Bank, which became the latest financial company to report strong first-quarter results. Technology companies were led by chipmaker Nvidia and Google parent company Alphabet, while online retail giant Amazon and streaming video company Netflix also made large gains.

"It was good news to see a positive number coming out of the world's second-largest economy," said Quincy Krosby, market strategist at Prudential Financial. "It was the strongest GDP reading in six quarters, and much of it was based on their infrastructure spending and also the housing market."

The Standard & Poor's 500 index climbed 20.06 points, or 0.9 percent, to 2,349.01. The Dow Jones industrial average rose 183.67 points, or 0.9 percent, to 20,636.92. The Nasdaq composite jumped 51.64 points, or 0.9 percent, to 5,856.79. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks soared

15.94 points, or 1.2 percent, to 1,361.18.

China's recovering economy grew another 6.9 percent in the first quarter. In 2016 it grew at its slowest pace in almost 30 years, and the government spent more money on construction of infrastructure such as roads and bridges in response. Relatively cheap credit also boosted property sales.

Medical device maker Alere surged after it accepted a modified buyout offer from Abbott Laboratories. Abbott agreed to buy Alere for \$56 per share, or \$5.8 billion, more than a year ago. But it filed a lawsuit to end the deal after Alere recalled a key product, delayed filing a financial statement, and faced a Justice Department investigation into its business outside the U.S.

Under the new agreement Abbott will pay \$51 a share, or about \$5.3 billion, and Alere climbed \$6.74, or 15.9 percent, to \$49.05. It had traded as low as \$31.47 last July, as investors worried the deal would fall apart after news of the investigation broke. Abbott rose 64 cents, or 1.5 percent, to \$43.31.

Arconic jumped after the company said Chairman and CEO Klaus Kleinfeld agreed to step down after the board of directors discovered that he sent a letter to Arconic's largest shareholder, activist investment firm Elliott Management, without telling the board. Arconic said that was "poor judgment." It didn't say what Kleinfeld wrote in the letter.

United, Chicago agree to preserve evidence in passenger incident

CHICAGO — United Airlines and the city of Chicago have agreed to keep video and other records from a flight where a passenger who refused to give up his seat was dragged off the plane, the passenger's attorney said.

Attorneys for the passenger, David Dao, took the first step toward a lawsuit last week, asking the Cook County Circuit Court for an order requiring United and the city to preserve records of the incident and the personnel files of the Aviation Department officers who pulled Dao from the plane.

A hearing scheduled for Monday morning was canceled because United and the city "agreed to preserve and protect the evidence requested," Dao's attorney, Thomas Demetrio, said in a statement.

United declined to comment, citing the potential litigation. "Our focus is reviewing our policies so

something like this doesn't happen again," said spokesman Jonathan Guerin.

Dao, 69, of Elizabethtown, Ky., was one of four passengers picked to be bumped from a flight from

Chicago's O'Hare International Airport to Louisville, Ky. to make room for airline employees added to the flight shortly before it departed April 9.

When Dao refused to

leave his seat, Aviation Department officers dragged him from the plane. Dao suffered a significant concussion, a broken nose and a sinus injury and lost two front teeth, according to Demetrio, who said the incident likely will result in a lawsuit.

United, facing fierce criticism after videos of the incident went viral, said it is reviewing its policies around oversold flights. Results of that review are expected by the end of the month. The airline already has announced some changes, including requiring United employees traveling for work to book seats at least an hour in advance to avoid displacing customers already on board an aircraft.

United also said it will not ask law enforcement officers to remove passengers from flights unless it is a matter of safety and security and plans to improve training programs "to ensure our employees are prepared and empowered to put our customers first."

United's 1Q profit fell 69 percent, before dragging incident

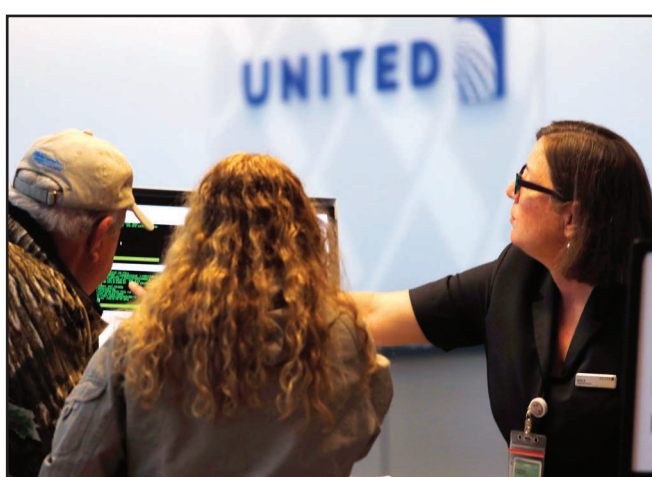
DALLAS — United Airlines' profit plunged 69 percent in the first three months of the year, and that was before the terrible publicity surrounding the dragging of a bloodied passenger off a plane.

The cost of fuel, labor and maintenance all rose sharply in the first quarter, helping push United's profit down to \$96 million, despite higher revenue.

The results released Monday beat Wall Street expectations, however. United performed better by other measures — more cancellation-free days, fewer lost bags.

The power to raise prices was also swinging United's way. A key revenue-per-mile figure was flat, adding to evidence that a two-year decline in average fares is over. United expects the revenue-per-mile figure to rise by 1 to 3 percent in the second quarter.

It is unclear whether last week's incident in which Chicago airport officers dragged a 69-year-old man off a United Express plane

will halt United's progress. CEO Oscar Munoz issued another apology Monday.

"It is obvious from recent experiences that we need to do a much better job serving our customers," Munoz said in a statement. He said the company is "dedicated to setting the standard for customer service among U.S. airlines."

While the April 9 United Express Flight 3411 made headlines all last week, it has had little effect on United's stock. United Continental Holdings Inc. stock fell about the same as shares of Delta, Alaska and JetBlue last week.

Ahead of its report, United led a rally in airline stocks Monday. The Chicago-based company's

shares rose \$1.70, or 2.5 percent, to close at \$70.77. After the financial results were released, the shares gained another 73 cents in after-hours trading.

Excluding non-repeating items, United said first-quarter profit was 41 cents per share. Wall Street expected 38 cents per share, according to a FactSet survey of 16 analysts.

Revenue rose 3 percent to \$8.42 billion, also topping forecasts. But operating costs jumped 8 percent, driven by a 28 percent increase in fuel, a 7 percent rise in labor, and a 13 percent increase in maintenance and repair expenses.

Airlines are prospering from travel demand that remains relatively strong. Reduced competition — several major airports are dominated by one or two carriers — may limit United's financial fallout to the dragging incident.

Still, Cowen and Co. analyst Helene Becker said Monday that investors should be concerned if the incident leads to more government regulation of the airlines.
